




MIDDLE EGYPT

During the tour you will visit all the highlights of Middle Egypt, located between Cairo and Luxor. Middle Egypt has a lot to offer – one of the ancient capitals of Egypt, Tell el-Amarna – the city created by Egypt's most controversial pharaoh Akhenaten in honor of Aten, the sun disc god. You will discover beautiful Egyptian rock-cut tombs in Beni Hasan, carved into the high limestone cliffs. We will continue the tour with the visit to Tuna el-Gebel, the necropolis of Khmun with an impressive complex of underground catacombs used to store thousands of animal mummies. It is the very spot where Dr. Zahi Hawass began his career as an Egyptologist.

You will see the temple of Seti I in Abydos, known as one of the most beautiful temples in Egypt, once the holiest site in the country and the burial place of the first kings of a unified Egypt. Later on we will travel to Dendera to visit the temple of Hathor, which will take your breath away with its monumental columns and spectacular ceilings with the most vibrant and colorful paintings dating from antiquity.









UNKNOWN PYRAMIDS

In proximity to the famous Giza Plateau, we will visit the ancient sites of the Forgotten Pyramids, starting with the pyramids of the Old Kingdom in Abu Rawash and Abu Sir, over 4,500 years old, built during the reign of the 4th and 5th Dynasty of Egyptian Pharaohs. Abu Rawash and Abu Sir are closed to the visitors, but *Archaeological Paths* received a special permission from the Minister of Antiquities to visit these unique monuments. We will later go south to visit Meidum with an enormous pyramid built by pharaoh Snefru and we will continue to the pyramids of the 12th Dynasty in Lisht and Hawara that will complete your full tour of Egypt's unknown pyramids.





BAHARIYA OASIS

Our journey will then take us to the most magical sites in Egypt in the Oasis of Bahariya. We will visit the beautifully decorated Egyptian tombs from 500 BC and the Temple of Alexander the Great, where he is popularly believed to be buried.

The most spectacular highlight in Bahariya will be the Valley of the Golden Mummies – the biggest discovery made by Dr. Zahi Hawass over the course of his distinguished career. On the area of 2.3 square miles Dr. Hawass found a big valley that consists of 10,000 mummies completely covered with gold. It was one of the most sensational discoveries in Egypt since the discovery of Tutankhamun's tomb.

The site of The Valley of the Golden Mummies is normally closed for visitors, but the guests of *Archaeological Paths* will have the privilege to be the only group to visit the Valley together with its discoverer Dr. Zahi Hawass!






TAPOSIRIS MAGNA (Alexandria)

We will continue our tour of Egyptian mysteries to the temple of Taposiris Magna near Alexandria, where archaeologists are excavating in search for the tomb of the last Queen of Egypt – Cleopatra.

Taposiris Magna was one of the most important temples built in the New Kingdom for the goddess Isis. The researchers believe it may hide the tomb of one of the most famous female rulers of Ancient Egypt, Cleopatra. The site is closed to all other tourist groups due to ongoing excavations, but our group received the permission to visit the temple and see the archaeologists at work.





OLD CAIRO

Our tour will show you the real culture and customs of Egypt by taking you to the streets, churches and mosques of Coptic and Islamic Cairo, and also to enjoy the local cafes and restaurants. You will visit Al Muizz Street – the oldest street in Cairo with the greatest concentration of medieval architectural treasures in the Islamic world! You will visit newly-renovated Synagogue of Moses, the great Textile Museum and the Coptic Museum with a collection of Egyptian Christian artifacts.




research as the director of excavations. For years he was also the main Egyptologist Inspector of this site. Dr. Tarek will guide us on the pyramid complex of Abu Sir and show us the important role this site played in the past.


DAY 3: Abu Sir and Abu Rawash with Dr. Tarek El-Awady

Another day full of attractions, we will not only see the sites closed to the general public, but also we will have the unique opportunity to meet our special guest - Dr. Tarek El-Awady.

First, we will drive south from Giza, to the Sun Temple and the pyramids at Abu Sir. You will see the pyramids of the Fifth Dynasty Kings of Egypt (2400 BC), called the Kings of the Sun, because they were the first to build the Sun Temples. Next to the pyramids, you will see the biggest Old Kingdom non-royal tomb of a high official called Ptahshepses. The name Abu Sir came from the ancient word "Der Osir", meaning "the House of Osiris", the god of the underworld who was one of the most important gods in the Ancient Egypt. The name of Abu Sir allows us to understand how important this site was to the Ancient Egyptians.

There is no better person to present this site to our guests than Dr. Tarek El-Awady who worked as Chief Archaeologist Inspector of Abu Sir and conducted excavations at this site.

"I am Dr. Tarek El-Awady. I worked in Abu Sir as the Field Director of the excavation. We had many wonderful discoveries there. For the first time ever Archaeological Paths made it possible for you to come and visit Abu Sir, known as the site of the Forgotten Pyramids. I take this chance to invite all of you to come with me and feel the magic of the pyramids around you. Abu Sir is one of the most magnificent archaeological sites in Egypt. It is closed for tourists, but thanks to Archaeological Paths it is open with a special permission for you to visit and enjoy the magic of the pyramids. Actually I am very happy that I will accompany you when you visit Abu Sir. I will tell you the story of my excavation in the site and also we will talk about the story of the pyramids in Abu Sir and the Sun Temples."



After lunch we will drive 5 miles north of Giza, to **Abu Rawash** – it is the site of Egypt's most northerly pyramid, also known as the Lost Pyramid. Originally, it was thought that this pyramid had never been completed, but the current archaeological consensus is that not only was it completed, but that it was built about the same size as the Pyramid of Menkaure – the third largest of the Giza Great Pyramids.

When Djedefre, a son of the Khufu, who built the Great Pyramid, ascended the throne he moved 8 km north of the Giza Plateau for building a very different pyramid complex on an even higher plateau that looks down upon Giza. Did he rebel from the family line? Within a decade or two, Khafre brought the court back to Giza to build the Second Pyramid and, probably, the Great Sphinx. Together with *Archaeological Paths* we will explore the mysterious Abu Rawash pyramid and learn what 13 years of recent excavations by Swiss and French Institute teams have discovered.



DAY 4: Meidum, Lisht and Hawara

After breakfast we will start our journey along the Nile, south towards the Middle Egypt. On the way, we will visit the major pyramid sites, starting with Meidum, an enormous pyramid built by Snefru, father of Khufu who later built the Great Pyramid in Giza. In many ways, Meidum is the most mysterious of all the Great Pyramids. No sarcophagus was found inside the burial chamber and there is no evidence that Snefru was ever buried in this pyramid. Located nearby is a mastaba of an unknown noble, where you will see the first example of a red granite sarcophagus known in antiquity.

Next we will see the Pyramid of Amenemhet I built in Lisht by the founder of Egypt's 12th Dynasty. Amenemhet I was most likely the first ruler of the Middle Kingdom. He led Egypt into the new era called the Golden Age.

We will continue to the Hawara pyramid of Amenemhet III, the sixth pharaoh of the 12th Dynasty who lived around 1850 BC. Hawara is the largest Middle Kingdom funerary complex. The Greek traveler Herodotus claimed to have counted three thousand rooms in the pyramid's complex. Herodotus visited the pyramid during the 5th century BC and described it as follows: 12 main courts and the visitor was guided from courtyards into rooms into galleries into more rooms and from there into more courtyards.

After completing our tour of the pyramids, we will continue on through the rural areas of Egypt to the town of Minya where we will stay in a hotel with a view on the Nile.




Day 5: Tuna el-Gebel with Dr. Zahi Hawass, Beni Hasan

After breakfast we will visit Tuna el-Gebel, the necropolis of Khmun. Here we will see the catacombs that used to store thousands of animal mummies, a Late Period temple, one of the boundary stelae of Tel el-Amarna and the tomb of Petosiris with exquisite paintings from 300 BC.

During the sightseeing we will be joined by Dr. Zahi Hawass, who will tell us about his work in Tuna el-Gebel. Dr. Hawass has begun his lifelong career in Egyptology on this site. He will tell us more about the history of Tel el-Amarna and the life of its founder, the pharaoh Akhenaten.

We will continue our tour to rock-cut tombs of the nobles in Beni Hasan, carved into the high limestone cliffs, a Middle Kingdom site (2040 - 1640 BC). It gives us a rare insight into the daily life of Ancient Egyptians, their customs and beliefs. These very well preserved scenes depict acrobatics, dancing and military sports. You can also spot the scenes of making flour, baking bread, and even a husband and wife on their wedding night.






DAY 6: Tel el-Amarna

In the morning we will visit Tel el-Amarna, one of the ancient capitals of Egypt, the city created by Egypt's most controversial pharaoh Akhenaten. It was here that Akhenaten pursued his vision of a society dedicated to the cult of one god, the power of the sun, Aten. We will visit the nobles' tombs with wall reliefs unequalled anywhere else in Egypt. The painted scenes appear alive and even as though they are moving. We will also visit the Royal Palaces and the tomb built for pharaoh Akhenaten.

DAY 7: Akhmim and Abydos


After breakfast we will drive along the Nile to the city of Akhmim. We will see a recently discovered colossal statue of Meryetamun (Beloved of the God Amun), the tallest statue of an ancient queen ever found – 36 feet tall. She was one of the consorts of Rameses II after the death of Nefertari.

Next we will drive to Abydos to see the temple of Seti I, once the holiest site in the country and the burial place for the first kings of unified Egypt. Its construction begun in the reign of Seti I and was finished by his son, Ramesses the Great. The temple built of fine white limestone represents an artistic revival of the Old Kingdom.





ITINERARY



DAY 8: Dendera and Luxor

After breakfast we will travel to Dendera to see the temple dedicated to the goddess Hathor, with its colossal columns and spectacular ceilings with the most vibrant and colorful paintings dating from antiquity. It is one of the best-preserved temples in Egypt. The whole complex extends to around 430,000 square feet. Dendera itself was a site for chapels and shrines from the beginning of Ancient Egypt's history.

After the sightseeing in Dendera we will drive to Luxor to check in at our luxurious 5-star hotel.

Day 9: Luxor – Ramesseum, Luxor Museum, The Valley of the Kings, Lecture with Dr. Mostafa Waziri

After breakfast we will visit the Ramesseum, the memorial temple of pharaoh Ramesses the Great, located in Luxor. The temple, famous for its 57-foot seated statue of Ramesses was dedicated to the god Amon and the deceased king. The walls of the Ramesseum are decorated with reliefs, including well-preserved paintings of battle scenes and the triumphs of wars with Asians.


We will also visit the most iconic site of Luxor – The Valley of the Kings. It was the royal cemetery for 62 Pharaohs. In the Valley we will have access to some of the well-known tombs. It is undeniably one of Egypt's most important treasures.

We will continue with a tour of Luxor Museum with new sections recently opened by Dr. Zahi Hawass. Highlights of the collection include masterpieces of pharaonic art as well as examples of everyday objects.

In the afternoon we will meet with today's chief of all antiquities in the Upper Egypt, including those in Luxor – Dr. Mostafa Waziri. He will introduce us to the most important recent archaeological discoveries in Luxor. Dr. Waziri will also talk about the ongoing excavations and the plans for the future.

Day 10: Flight to Cairo, multimedia lecture with Dr. Zahi Hawass

We will take a flight from Luxor to Cairo. We will arrive to our 5-star hotel to rest and in the afternoon we will take part in a multimedia lecture given by Dr. Zahi Hawass, who will share with us the news about archaeological research in Foynt




DAY 11: Bahariya, The Valley of the Golden Mummies with Dr. Zahi Hawass

After breakfast we will head to Bahariya Oasis, once the richest region in Egypt thanks to the production of very expensive wine. We will check in at our hotel in the Oasis and have lunch to taste the local specialties. We will start the sightseeing with the greatest site in the Oasis – The Valley of the Golden Mummies, together with Dr. Zahi Hawass.

Dr. Hawass will guide us at the site that he discovered – the Valley of the Golden Mummies – which he calls the most important discovery of his entire career! During the first season of excavations, a total of 108 mummies were found in four tombs. Dr. Hawass said: "When the first tomb was opened, the brilliance of gold shone in the sunlight among the piles of sand". The cemetery, which is thought to cover an area of approximately 2.3 square miles, has been estimated to contain more than 10,000 mummies!

Dr. Zahi Hawass: When people ask me which of my discoveries has meant the most to me personally, I often think first of the Valley of the Golden Mummies at Bahariya Oasis. Introducing this amazing site to the world propelled me into an international spotlight. I feel privileged to have been a part of this story, which is my own personal history as well as the history of Egyptian archaeology.

The Valley is normally closed to visitors, but the guests of *Archaeological Paths* will have the privilege to be the only tourist group to visit it. After the sightseeing in the Valley, we will go to the museum in Bahariya to see the most beautiful golden mummies.



DAY 12: Bahariya, drive to Alexandria

After breakfast we will drive to the temple of Ain el-Muftella, which consist of four chapels decorated with painted reliefs. The next stop in our itinerary are the Egyptian tombs from the 26th Dynasty, the last native dynasty to rule Egypt before the Persian conquest in 525 BC. We will visit two tombs made for wealthy merchants, containing amazing colored scenes that are perfectly preserved.

After lunch we will drive to the Temple of Alexander the Great. It is the only temple in Egypt built by and for Alexander. "This is a unique temple, it came out of the sand of Bahariya Oasis to complete the Valley of the Golden Mummies. Actually people could be buried in the Valley of the Golden Mummies near the temple because they wanted to be near Alexander the Great. This temple is important because you can learn a lot about archaeology from visiting and studying it. This is a unique site where people can come and witness the beauty and the magic of archaeology" – Dr. Zahi Hawass.

After lunch we will leave Bahariya Oasis to drive to Alexandria and check in at our 5-star hotel.





Day 13: Taposiris Magna with Dr. Zahi Hawass, Alexandria

After breakfast our group will have the opportunity to visit the temple of Taposiris Magna with Dr. Zahi Hawass. It is an active research site located west of Alexandria. In the last 11 years, Dr. Hawass and Dr. Kathleen Martínez have been excavating the temple in search for the tombs of Cleopatra and Mark Antony. Dr. Hawass will tell us more about the story behind the excavations. We will also meet the archaeologists working at the site and they will tell us about the progress of their work. It is another attraction open only to the guests of *Archaeological Paths* company and closed to the public.



I'm Dr. Kathleen Martínez and I'm inviting you to come to Taposiris Magna, the most exciting temple in Alexandria. Visit us with Archaeological Paths. We will take you around to see all our discoveries. There is so much we have to show you there. Once you enter the temple, you can breathe – there is mystery all over this site.

I studied Cleopatra as a historical character for fifteen years and I think I deciphered one of the greatest mysteries: where is the lost tomb of Cleopatra? I placed the tomb at Taposiris Magna. I will tell you why. Cleopatra was the human representation of the goddess Isis. Taposiris Magna was the most important temple dedicated to Isis during the Ptolemy period and we were able to prove that. If it's so, there is no other place in Egypt that could be the final resting place of Cleopatra than Taposiris Magna.

I came to Egypt in 2005 trying to visit the Secretary General of the Supreme Council of Antiquities, Dr. Zahi Hawass, to explain my theory and ask him for the permission to visit Taposiris Magna. He understood the importance of searching for Cleopatra. At the beginning he said to me: "If there is one percent of probability that the last queen of Egypt could be buried in Taposiris Magna, she deserves to be found."

In the moment I entered this temple, immediately I knew I was in the right place. Now we have archaeological evidence that I was right. We found many artifacts that belong to Cleopatra's time. Every time we discover something, we feel we are closer to finding her. My theory has been proved in 80%, we are now on the path to discover her tomb. Dr. Hawass has been working with us since the beginning up till today. He has been a great partner and the experience that he had helped us achieve all that we have done at Taposiris Magna.

After the sightseeing with Dr. Hawass in Taposiris Magna and after lunch with a view on the Mediterranean Sea, we will visit the highlights of Alexandria. Being the second largest city in Egypt, Alexandria has an atmosphere that is more Mediterranean than Middle Eastern and is famous for its Roman remains. Alexandria was founded by Alexander the Great in 332 BC, and was the capital of Greco-Roman Egypt. We will visit all the major sites there, including Alexandria Library, the catacombs of Kom ash-Shuqqafa, the harbor of Alexandria and the place where the famous Pharos Lighthouse was standing. It was one of the Seven Wonders of the Ancient World. In the evening we will return to our 5-star hotel in Cairo.



Day 14: Departures

It is the last day of our tour and time to say goodbye to Egypt. After breakfast we will transfer you to the Cairo International Airport. We will leave Egypt with new experiences, memories and beautiful photographs. *Archaeological Paths* company will do everything to ensure that our guests will have the time of their lives during our exciting adventure.

tourists each month. Tourism is one of the most important parts of Egyptian economy and provides jobs for millions of Egyptians. Egypt has a third of the world's ancient riches and probably another two-thirds not yet discovered.



Dr. Mostafa Waziri, General Director of Luxor Antiquties:

I'm the General Director of the Antiquities Office in Luxor, so I'm responsible for Karnak and Luxor temples, Valley of the Kings, Hatshepsut temple – all the sites in Luxor. Egypt is safe and secure and you will see this when you come. You are going to meet a lot of tourists from all over the world. We have Americans, English, French, Germans,

Chinese and others. They are enjoying all the sites and in fact the number of tourists is increasing nowadays. It's calm and you will enjoy great weather.

You can walk around with your camera and film anywhere you like. You can ask anybody: do you feel Egypt is safe? They will say, definitely – yes, Egypt is safe. We have cameras almost everywhere on the east side and the west side of the Nile. We have security police working 24 hours a day, they are taking good care of the tourists. I will give you an example: Luxor temple – one of the greatest temples in Egypt, especially by night it looks really amazing. Before we reach Luxor temple, we have to go through an X-Ray archway to make sure that we don't have any metals. The visitors have to leave everything outside and the security makes sure that they are OK to come inside.

We have also resident tourists – they live here in Luxor. More than seven thousand tourists from all over the world live in Luxor and they are very safe.



Mohamed Badr, the governor of Luxor:

I am the governor of Luxor and my first comment about safety in Egypt is that it is not an issue. All the sites in Egypt – Luxor, Aswan and Cairo are safe. You can walk all over the streets at any time of the day and night, you can enjoy your life, enjoy your time while over here. People are very hospitable and you will not find any place in the world like Egypt.

Dr. Zahi Hawass, world's most famous archaeologist:

I want to say to all of you – Egypt is completely safe. Come and see for yourself – you will be in good hands and all the Egyptians will welcome you. In the last years there was not one tourist hurt at any site in the country. The safety of Egypt is visible everywhere. All the archaeological sites and hotels are completely secured.
